

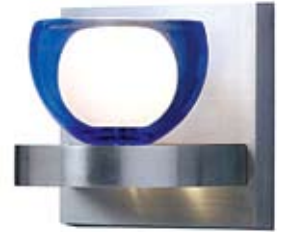

Without the proper lighting, all the other wonderful selections and architectural details within the home may very well go unnoticed.

Remember two things

New LR6 bulb uses 85% less energy

Have lighting and recessed fixtures really come that far in the past few years? Homeowners have a tendency to over "can" their homes, sometimes to the point where it creates a landing strip effect. Unless one is trying to flag down their local alien, take it easy on the cans! The new recessed lights are amazing. The standard 6" can be purchased for about \$15.00 a piece but only have 2,000 hours of bulb life. One fixture can cost approximately \$900.00 over an eight year span. The new LED lights can cost about \$145.00 each (including bulb) but average 50,000 hours (20 years) bulb life. The new LR6 bulb uses 85% less energy than a conventional incandescent, less than half of a comparable fluorescent AND does not contain mercury! They are warm to the touch and create a beautiful glow. If one wants to go green, they should definitely consider using the new LR6 bulb.

Speaking of green, by adding dimmers to overhead lights, lamps and fixtures, one can save energy and easily control mood lighting in the home. It is an inexpensive way to change the mood of a room.
